MS. DIGLIO: Good evening again everyone. This is The Regional EMS Council of New York City's Public Hearing on the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Service Expansion CON Application.

Tonight, our Ambulance Committee and many REMSCO members are here to listen to public comment on the application that has already been reviewed and deemed complete by The Regional EMS Council. I would like to introduce Frank Schorn. He is our hearing officer. He has been a hearing officer several times before and he will be leading this meeting.

The way we run the meeting is we will have -- we already have speakers and -- speakers who are presenting for the applicant and then speakers who are in opposition or in support of the application. Everyone will have a chance to speak as long as they are on the speakers list and the hearing

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 officer does have the right to allow other people to speak if he thinks it's okay. He will limit your time depending on our time here in the meeting and does anyone have any questions?

MR. MEKETANSKY: That's me, Dave

Meketansky. Henry, our president of

Glen Oaks, is having trouble logging on

right now. He's working on it. I'm not

sure if he's in the waiting room or not.

MS. DIGLIO: Joe will check on that.

Once the hearing is over, the hearing officer has ten days to produce a report with his recommendation, which will be submitted to our ambulance committee and Regional Council for consideration and vote. The hearing officer only gives a recommendation. The actual decision and recommendation to the State is done by The Regional Council. Our Regional Council meeting will be will held on November 17th and that's when we will be having our vote with regards to this application.

I have known Henry going back for many years. I am a former volunteer EMT in Glendale so I have known Henry going back to 1995, 1996 and I have seen

S-C-H-O-R-N. A strong and hardy welcome
to our stenographer and thank you for
your patience. You are probably going
to be doing this on audio and not
watching us, am I right, ma'am.

MS. REPORTER: I am going to try to watch, but it would be very helpful if everyone just stated their name before they spoke because I don't see everyone that's probably on the line on my screen.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I am going to do my best to identify myself. You

A couple of more pieces of business, the plan that I would like to have is we are going to probably blocks of five minutes. The applicant I'm going to give a little more time to. The representative from Greenberg Traurig, you are going to be presenting on behalf of the applicant and that's Mr. Berlin, am I right?

MR. BERLIN: That's correct.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I assume so because you are the only person here in the room with a tie. Feel free to join or not join without, Mr. Berlin, but you are very welcomed here tonight. So would you feel you are going to need more than five minutes?

MR. BERLIN: The plan here is I was just going to give a brief opening, very brief, and then turn it over to Mr.

EHRHARDT: I am here now. 6 I was 7 having technical difficulties. MR. BERLIN: 8 All right, great. 9 was scrolling through from the gallery 10 view, but I think the plan would be 11 that, you know, I would just give a very 12 brief statement and if you would allow 13 it, I would reserve time to make a 14 closing statement on behalf of the 15 applicant. 16 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Absolutely 17 and I would like to try to see if we can do it -- if at all, if we can kind of 18 19 have questions for speakers that we try 20 to keep the questions appropriate. 21 the proponents for the application have 22 multiple speakers and I assume there 23 will be, I would like to see if we could 24 try to avoid cumulative information, so 25 if stuff has already been presented and

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 shared, that it not be repeated. The goal is not to introduce new material at this hearing. It's to identify and point to material contained in the application. So for those of you who know this and who have done this a couple of times or more and some of you may have far more experience in these things than I, but I have been very fortunate to be doing this, I don't know, probably less than ten, but maybe around ten times or so.

We have a certificate of need and the process is the process and the standards are the standards and while it would seem, well, why wouldn't we want another ambulance, especially in the days of COVID, especially when it could be a potentially life-saving presence in someone's life, we are limited to what the New York State Department of Health requires us to do and we need to have the applicant, Glen Oaks, make its case, not beyond reasonable doubt, that's a

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 criminal standard, but it's more likely than not, preponderance of the evidence, but the applicant, Glen Oaks, has the burden of proof and that even so, you know, I come from a volunteer ambulance background and I have had many years connected to Central Park Medical Unit and as I mentioned earlier, my connections to Glendale when I began and that's where I believe I first met Mr. Ehrhardt. That all being said, the burden is on the applicant and Glen Oaks needs to prove and it's not as simple as it appears and the last application that I had, I think was last November was finally finalized, you know, after appeals and decisions and whatnot in probably August or so of this year, so it gets complicated.

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I will ask that we keep it civil.

We may know each other. Please keep it civil. Don't make it on a personal level and let's see if we can all take the highroad tonight.

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I'm going to be very respectful of peoples times. I don't want to list a whole bunch of rules. I would rather be more organic and forward thinking as far as this goes, but if there are issues, we will address them. If somehow there's a feeling that fairness is not happening, I need to know it and I will try to correct it. If it's happening, it certainly would be inadvertent. goal is to have a fair public hearing and that includes people who are not necessarily the people who are indirect interest in this situation, the Glen Oaks and the other valleys who appear to be in opposition.

I want to hear. I have an open mind. I have not made any decision. My decision is purely recommendation. Even once I make up my mind and there's a lot of esteemed and intelligent people on both the Ambulance Committee and The Regional Council, so I'm very happy for them to be there.

Thank 3 4 you again to Marie, thank you to Joe, 5 thank you to the rest of the REMSCO staff that's here tonight to make it all 6 7 happen and that being said, I'm ready to 8 get the ball rolling. 9 Any preliminaries, any questions, 10 any issues before we begin? All right. So questions will come from the 11 Ambulance Committee that are here 12 tonight. Who is here from the Ambulance 13 14 Committee, just so I have an idea? 15 MR. RANERI: Marie, would you like 16 to give a breakdown of that? 17 MS. DIGLIO: Most of the individuals here tonight are from either the 18 19 Ambulance Committee or The Regional 20 Council. Aside from our speakers and 21 our presenters who you have on the 22 presenters list, I'm not seeing anybody 23 here that doesn't belong here. 24 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Just so I'm 25 clear, Mr. Berlin, you expect to speak.

BERLIN: So on the list, which 6 was sent in, is Susan Seinfeld, Louis 7 I'm not sure if it's going to be Greco. 8 Joe Marzilliano or Eileen Miller, I am 9 not sure which one is here and who is 10 going to speak, and Charles Silverstein 11 are the people that were listed as our 12 speakers. 13 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you. Are they all here, do we know? 14 15 MR. BERLIN: I believe so. 16 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: And in 17 opposition, we have people who signed up in opposition who are already present? 18 19 MR. BERLIN: Yes, it looks like it. 20 I mean, I don't mean to speak for them. 21 The the names of the people on the list 22 appear to be in the Zoom call. 23 Frank, I'm going to go MS. DIGLIO: 24 over the list and I will doublecheck 25 right now.

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Just so I'm clear. My apologies, using my laptop would be a piece of cake. Running back and forth on my iPad is less easy.

MR. EHRHARDT: I know Sue Sienfeld is saying she's having some difficulties getting into the meeting and I know the Community Board 11 folks have a meeting tonight that came up with City agency, so I don't know if they are going to be able to join us.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you.

Since we have enough folks over here,

I'm willing to get things going. I want
to be respectful of your time. I know
we are already 20 minutes after the
hour. So if we can, Mr. Berlin, do you
want to hit us off and --

MR. BERLIN: Yes. Just briefly, as
I said, I'm representing the Glen Oaks
Volunteer Ambulance Corps and as it
detailed in the organizations thorough
application there is a clear public need
for community based volunteer ambulance

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 corp servicing these Bayside and Oakland Gardens communities. Moreover, Glen Oaks is perfectly positioned through its resources and experience to provide those services.

I think that anyone who reads through the application will see the great detail that was put in and that each of the criteria, which are supposed to be evaluated, are amply met. On the details of that, I think it's better to come from Mr. Ehrhardt who is the president of the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Corp and I think his opening statement will address and summarize the application and lead to any questions that you may have, so I will turn it over to Mr. Ehrhardt.

MR. EHRHARDT: Thank you. Good evening, Hearing Office Schorn and members of the Ambulance Committee of The Regional Emergency Medical Services Council.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr.

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 Ehrhardt, if you could, please spell 3 your name for the stenographer? 4 MR. EHRHARDT: Sure, 5 E-H-R-H-A-R-D-T. HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: 6 Thank you. 7 MR. EHRHARDT: And members of the 8 Ambulance Committee of The Regional 9 Emergency Medical Services Council for 10 New York City. Thank you for the 11 opportunity to speak tonight about the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Corp 12 13 application to expand its primary 14 operating area. The Glen Oaks Volunteer 15 Ambulance Corp was founded in 1973 and 16 for approaching five decades, we have 17 continuously been providing community based EMS services to the Northeast 18 19 Queens community of North Bellerose, 20 Floral Park, Glen Oaks, New Hyde Park, 21 North Shore Towers and Queens Community District 13 and Oakland Gardens, which 22 23 some people also refer to as Southern 24 Bayside in Queens Community District 11. Glen Oaks VAC is a participant in 25

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 The Regional Volunteer EMS Mutual Aid 2 Plan and The Regional EMS Council of New 3 York City FDNY EMS Mobilization Plan. 4 5 The Bayside Community Volunteer Ambulance Corp has effectively not been 6 7 providing service for half a decade and 8 over two years ago the New York State 9 Department of Health Bureau of EMS 10 revoked its ambulance operating certificate. Prior to this, numerous 11 outreach efforts and offers of 12 13 assistance were made by GOVAC, other 14 neighboring volunteer ambulance corps as 15 well as by Community Board 11, local 16 officials and the Department of Health 17 Bureau of EMS Staff. These efforts went unanswered and their leadership was 18 19 nonresponsive. The 40,000 plus 20 residents in this area deserve better. 21 Glen Oaks VAC with 70 plus EMTs, 10 22 paramedics, 30 dispatchers and two dozen 23 youth squad members is ready and quite 24 able to immediately provide service to 25 this area now.

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Currently the Glen Oaks Volunteer
Corp is requesting to expand its area
into the Bayside proffer neighborhood of
Community Board 11. The proposed area
is immediately adjacent to our existing
New York State DOH approved operating
community of Oakland Gardens within
Queens Community Board 11. As explained
in our application and supporting
appendices, we believe there remains a
need for a community volunteer EMS
agency in this area and that GOVAC is
best able to meet that meet.

Currently basic life support 911
ambulance resources are placed in
outlining areas of the community to
serve a larger geographical area given
the high volume of calls in other area,
those ambulances are often dispatched
into other communities leaving some gaps
in local availability. Additionally,
advanced life support units deployed to
the field often must travel from areas
in CB 13, 105 Precinct, CB 7, 109

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Precinct, as well as CBA 107 precinct based on availability.

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Our ALS ELS combination capabilities would provide additional advanced life support as well as ELS EMS resources to the community at no expense to the municipality or community. We also see that in fiscal year 2020 and combined overall response time from the 911 system our ambulances and fire companies to life threatening medical emergencies increased to 9 minutes and 31 seconds Citywide average. Make no mistake, we are fortunate to have the capable and competent 911 EMS system led by FDNY EMS and its dedicated office and staff managers and personnel along with voluntary hospital partners who typically handle 3,000 plus calls a day. We are also fortunate for the robust commercial EMS sector, which moves hundreds and sometimes thousands of patients a day amongst various healthcare facilities. The City and its

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 residents also benefit immensely when there is a robust community volunteer EMS agency dedicated to the community which helps to increase availability and reduce EMS response time, which GOVAC can do in the proposed area in terms of the size of New York City and even Queens County, this proposed expansion is a small area. As such, GOVAC expansion into this area will not have a detrimental impact on the current EMS system or existing services all who have vastly larger operating areas and EMS delivery models, but it will result in positive effects for the local community.

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There are a variety of potential modalities that can be considered and explored regarding our emergency response and response times to this expanded area. They range from equipping our members who live in or near the Bayside area as first responders to stationing an ambulance in

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 or closer to the area, this includes obtaining real estate to house vehicles and crews to make them even more accessible to this community. We also have indicated that in accordance with preexisting regional mutual aid agreements, we are also open to having our dispatchers and dispatch center continue to revoke calls to our projected new adjoining volunteer ambulance agencies when we may not be available or impeded by unusual circumstances. This would add to our existing mutual aid partners in the area.

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New York City is after all a highly diverse and highly dynamic place with eight and a half million residents and an additional two to three million workers and visitors present on any given day. A city that draws immigrants and sadly and tragically, as we particularly know, a city that is a target. As such, there is in a sense a

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 state of no normal in New York City. We now have seen SARS, Swine Flu, plane crashes, major MCIs, H1N1 and now COVID 19.

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Environmentally, New York City sees devastating heatwaves, cold spells, blizzards, tropical storms and hurricanes. Some of these events can and have happened in the same year. Given the projections for another potential COVID-19 spike, Glen Oaks, to help provide urgently needed added service now during a critical period. In addition to enhancing ambulance availability and reducing response times in its area, Glen Oaks has also been active in virtually every FDNY EMS volunteer sector activation. While we have dedicated a unit to these activations, we have also maintained unit coverage in our community. We have been able to do so because we have a good membership base and a sound financial footing. For sure we would

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 like to have more members and we continue to welcome interested individuals.

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As an EMS agency, we constantly strive to maintain the highest quality of care delivered to our patients. Glen Oaks VAC is proud to have a robust credentialing and orientation program comparing every new provider to meet our vigorous requirements. We have transitioned all records from paper to electronic ensuring the utmost security and compliance. We offer regular in-house training and call review provided by our members who are New York State Certified Instructor Coordinators, as well as guest lecturers and our agency medical director. We maintain a regular QAQI program with regular reviews of patient encounters and provide constructive feedback to crews.

GOVAC is also a participant in the West Queens Volunteer Ambulance
Association QAQI group. Additionally,

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 periodic call review sessions are hosted 3 at our headquarters moderated by our medical director. Glen Oaks is actively 4 5 involved in the community and regularly engages in updates local entities and 6 7 officials on our work and activities. 8 We are very pleased to have broad and 9 solid support from government entities, 10 local community planning agency, 11 community organizations and elected officials, letters of support in our 12 13 expansion range from the areas U.S. 14 congress woman, Queensborough president, 15 the local state senator, the assembly 16 person, the city council members, 17 Community Board 11 and the areas active local Bayside civil group. We also have 18 19 included letters from FDNY EMS and other 20 EMS services. 21

I also want to touch on some vital services that community volunteer EMS provides that are often overlooked.

Agencies such as ours serve as critical entry points to local youth and to the

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EMS profession that often lead into other medical and emergency services fields. This is a positive activity that has a profound impact on countless young lives in New York City. We have heard back from scores of EMTs, paramedics, nurses, physician's assistants and physicians about how their membership and activity with their community volunteer EMS agency changed their lives and gave them a new career path that they would not have otherwise anticipated.

Another important lead that we fulfill is providing medical aid, EMS standby and scores of local community events. These events are often too small to be on the radar of larger systems or technically don't require such services, still they draw hundreds of people and are vital to life in the communities throughout New York City.

We cover amenities on a pro bono basis for small nonprofit groups by

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 community VACs all over the City and we are one of them. There are many such events in the Bayside area that would also benefit from these services. I can tell you firsthand that over the years serving at such events Glen Oaks has within critical minutes of an occurrence treated several cases of anaphylactic reaction and other serious medical and trauma cases.

I also want to touch upon current realities in the environment in which community volunteer EMS faces today. If you have been involved in EMS leadership management or administration in a serious manner in the last decade and have not been keeping current -- and have been keeping current, then you know the challenges. I say the last decade because the challenges facing EMS and the work of EMS today are vastly different than they were a short time ago. This is particularly true for volunteer community EMS agencies.

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REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 Volunteer community EMS sector agencies find a lot of challenges in today's world from financial membership community expectations as well as leadership development. No longer is it realistic for small community EMS agencies to survive if they continue to live in their silos. These agenesis need a new approach to assure longterm sustainability, a larger base to draw members and contributions and to assure they can maintain a level of clinical experience for their members, join ventures, collaborations, operational arrangements and, yes, consolidations and mergers are all things that need to be seriously thought of and in many cases pursued. Communities and agencies can benefit from these approaches and from enlightened leadership that is willing to keep an open mind. At Glen Oaks we are committed to serving our communities and to helping build and strengthen and sustain the community

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 volunteer EMS system in Northeast Queens. We are open to working with our neighboring agencies on joint ventures, enhancements of mutual aid and collaborative experts and arrangements to achieve that goal. Thank you for your time and consideration this evening and during the process that moves forward.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you,
Mr. Ehrhardt. And I found it very
informative and I also have a number of
questions, so if you don't mind, I would
like to ask you a few questions in no
particular order unfortunately, but just
so I can follow them through. You
mentioned the service area existing is
in the far eastern part of Queens. Do
you have any coverage in Nassau County
or is your service only within the
borough of Queens?

MR. EHRHARDT: No. We are only in the borough of Queens, but I think you raised something interesting and let me

The ZIP line codes here do not follow political boundaries. 3 4 you look at the very eastern most 5 portion of our area that touches Nassau County, part of it is ZIP code 11040, 6 7 which is often addressed as New Hyde Park. A little sliver of that is actual 8 9 in Queens County and is usually 10 incorporated and called the Glen Oaks Community. Same time if you look at the 11 western end on the western side of 12 13 Little Neck Parkway north of Union 14 Turnpike, that area is ZIP code 11426. 15 Again, part of the overall larger 16 Greater Glen Oaks Community, but it is 17 sometimes addressed as Bellerose or North Bellerose. We are all in Queens 18 19 County. We don't cross the boundary 20 into Nassau. 21 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Do you have 22 any mutual agreement with Nassau County 23 or any Nassau County agencies? 24 MR. EHRHARDT: We do not although we 25 have directly called Manhasset Lakeville REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 on occasion and we have heard from them on occasion because obviously we share a common border along Lakeville Road and often there are incidents that occur in that community so we do have interaction with them.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you. You mentioned that towards the end of your presentation that joint ventures and collaborations and mergers may need to -- and I'm not being precise in my language, but may need to happen in the current environment and I think that there may be some concern that -- well, I have a question, is expansion of GOVAC placing risk of a Volunteer Ambulance Corps getting too big in your situation would you be stretching more than you can handle?

MR. EHRHARDT: No, I don't believe so. I believe we have the resources and capabilities to handle that. Let me just take care of my phone here. If you look at other agencies and some right

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near us, Jamaica Estates, for example,
Queens Village, Whitestone, they have
all areas that are of comparable size to
what we would become if we were granted
this area. Our area, in fact, currently
right now is one of the smaller service
areas in the city if you compare it to
Bedford Stuyvesant or Bravo or Valley
Forge on Staten Island, you know, we are
one of the smaller guys.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Following on that same kind of train of thought, would you have enough resources to go from a relatively condensed area and extend into Bayside, which would be a substantial increase in service area? Do you have enough downtime/resources/ambulances to --

MR. EHRHARDT: We have three ambulances right now so we are all late modeled in excellent shape. We have a solid base of volunteers. As I said, I was very pleased with the service we provided during COVID. We not only

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 entered the 911 activation, we also throughout the entire period while we had a unit in the 911 system, we had a unit in the community also continuing to serve the community for direct calls.

MR. BERLIN: I would just like to add in putting in this application, there was a very careful analysis of the resources that the organization -- sorry, this is Michael Berlin, Counsel -- of the resources that the organization had and after that evaluation, we felt very comfortable that this expansion would not tax our resources or would be any detriment to services of the people that would rely on us.

MR. EHRHARDT: I think it's also important to note that if you look at our area, while it looks big, a significant chunk of it is park land and, you know, so that gives the geography a little bit of a deceiving look in terms of that. Population wise,

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we would still, with the expanded area,
be under the population, we would have
less people than say Bravo, less people
than Ridgewood, less people than Queens
Village, less people than Jamaica
Estates, so population wise I believe
it's very manageable and size wise, as I
said, it still would not be the largest
volunteer agency in New York City by any
means.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you.

I have a question and I don't know the history as well as perhaps the neighbors in Eastern Queens, I live in Western Queens and Bayside the applicant has presented information, I think it's not contracted that there is no ambulance certificate for the Bayside volunteer organization. To what extent would GOVAC be willing to support a rejuvenated Bayside organization should that ever come to be, would you help provide service and if the organization comes in and says, you know, hey,

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Bayside for the Baysiders, would that be something that GOVAC would be willing to say, hey, okay, we are going to cede the responsibility of volunteer ambulance service to that community if they were to reconstitute?

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MR. BERLIN: The one thing I would say in just answering that, that's a very hypothetical situation. For more than two years there's been an opportunity to put in an application and to be able to -- for other organizations to do that, whatever happens in the future, I mean, we will certainly consider, but the truth of the matter is in front of us right now is a community which does not have these services and an organization that is ready and able and has the resources to do that. Obviously, you know, there's so many different permutations and other things and possibilities in the future, we certainly will look at things in the future, but I don't think it's relevant

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 and obviously we are going to answer your questions, but I think the real 3 4 question is whether or not we are qualified to do this and whether we will be able to meet this need for the 6 7 community. What happens in the future 8 we can obviously evaluate at that point, 9 but I think it's very hard to answer 10 that question because we don't know what form or where it will be or the 11 stability or who will be running or any 12 of those questions that are there. 13 14 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you. 15 16 going to open up to the ambulance

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I'm going to -- one further question I'm community and anyone on The Regional Council that wishes to speak to Mr. Ehrhardt and Mr. Berlin. Can you speak to any direct City support of your application?

There is a letter in MR. EHRHARDT: the application from the fire department, which is generally supportive, I would say.

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: All right. 3 I'm going to reserve any possible 4 questions perhaps until later. 5 MR. EHRHARDT: I will stay around 6 for as long as the hearing is open. 7 you want to go to other people, I don't 8 want to hold them up. 9 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Not a 10 problem. I'm going to ask if anyone has 11 any questions to either Mr. Ehrhardt or 12 Mr. Berlin on the application. 13 MR. DOWNEY: This is Jim Downey. 14 have a question or two. On the 15 application narrative, the proposed area 16 of service expansion is different from 17 the map that is included as Appendix A 18 proposed operating expansion area map. 19 Specifically the northwest corner in a 20 narrative would be Francis Lewis 21 Boulevard and 26th Avenue, however, in 22 Appendix A, the map, it shows going 23 north on Francis Lewis Boulevard and 24 then Utopia Parkway and then 26th 25 Avenue, so there is a slight discrepancy REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020
there and it would leave out a triangle
of residential areas, which would not be
covered by any Volunteer Ambulance
Corps, so I would propose that the map
be adjusted to show 26th Avenue and
Francis Lewis Boulevard as intersecting.

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MR. EHRHARDT: Thank you, Jim. intent was to mirror the boundary of Community Board 11, which I believe is 26th Avenue, you know, because we know that the State Department of Health has been generally taking the position that we shouldn't just draw lines on the map. We should use some identifiable boundary, so the identifiable boundary that we tried to follow on the northern end was the Community Board 11 boundary line. If we need to adjust that slightly to, in fact, do that, you know, certainly we would be amenable doing that.

MR. BERLIN: Yeah, to the extent that there is any error on the map, we are certainly happy to correct it. It

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 certainly wasn't our intention to have that as was sent. We tried to put in the map that was matching the previous boundaries, but we are happy to make that slight supplement, if necessary.

MR. DOWNEY: Again, Jim Downey, on the eastern side, again, the narrative is showing 26th Avenue to the north and Cross Island Parkway to the east, however, the map shows 26th Avenue going to Bell Boulevard and then a jog north to 24th Avenue continuing onto the Cross Island Parkway.

MR. EHRHARDT: That's correct, Jim.

That is the boundary of Community Board

11 and, in fact, that is the boundary of
the Bayside Volunteer Ambulance Corps

pursuant to a map from one of their

fundraising drives some years ago.

MR. DOWNEY: The 24th Avenue versus
26th Avenue borderline, I believe Bay
Terrace Country Club is on 24th, the
parking lot is on north and the pool and
clubhouse itself is south. I know Bay

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Community has serviced the country club for many years in the past. Is that going to be an issue in the future between the two squads if we go by 24th Avenue versus 26th Avenue?

MR. EHRHARDT: I would be more than happy -- if we obtain this area, I would be more than happy to sit down with Bay Community and, you know, work cooperatively to resolve any issue like that.

MR. DOWNEY: It would probably be easier right now just to use 26th Avenue as the northwest and northeast boundary. Again, that's a suggestion or clarification right now.

MR. EHRHARDT: I appreciate it. We don't want to vary from the community board line because that's what the State Department of Health is looking for, but I'm happy to work with our colleagues in Bay Community to resolve some issue like that. I think that's a resolvable issue between the two agencies.

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 I want to quickly MR. MEKETANSKY: 3 chime in on the map. Sorry, this is Dave Meketanksy from Glen Oaks. 4 5 26th Avenue doesn't go all the way east 6 to the Cross Island Parkway. Again, we 7 are sticking to that CB 11 -- sorry, I'm 8 looking at the map on my computer. CB 9 11 border that goes 24th Avenue and 10 heads right into that Bay Terrace 11 Country Club that goes directly to the 12 Cross Island Parkway. That's why that 13 map was created that way. 14 26th Avenue does curve MR. DOWNEY: 15

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into 27th Avenue and that goes to the Cross Island or near it.

MR. MEKETANSKY: It become Little Neck Boulevard it's called over there right by Service Auto Care.

MR. ORLANSKI: Hi, good evening, Scott Orlanski here. I'm sorry to be the stick in the mud here. I think everybody has had a long day. I think these little technicals with the map can be worked out and they don't really pose REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 any bearing on the public hearing or the need. If for some reason the application is approved, we can work out the technical details afterwards.

That's just my humble opinion in the hopes of moving this thing forward.

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Scott, thank you. I'm going to ask if there is any particular need to revisit your map, I'm going to ask the applicant to look over it carefully and take care of whatever needs to be done. I don't think we need to know the minutia to this level. I certainly don't need to do it. The Department of Health may, but please I'm going to ask if you need to have a minimus real minor change to the application, not a change, but a clarification of what the service area may or may not be, that would be presented to Regional Council who will include that if appropriate, if it's minor and not a new part of the application in the application itself.

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 MR. BERLIN: We are happy to adjust as needed and I don't think it bears on 3 4 the application, but we are certainly 5 happy to adjust as needed. We will take 6 a look at it afterwards, but I agree, 7 it's not something that I think should 8 affect the application one way or 9 another. 10 I tend to disagree. MR. DOWNEY: 11 This was a concern at the last public 12 hearing on an operating area. HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Just one 13 second, Jim. We had two voices. We had 14 15 Michael Berlin who was speaking and the 16 very last person was Jim Downey, 17 D-O-W-N-E-Y, we had Mr. Meketansky -- I 18 am going to do it phonetically for the 19 transcription -- M-E-K-E-T-A-N-S-K-Y and 20 first name Dave, D-A-V-E. 21 Mr. Downey, go ahead. 22 MR. EHRHARDT: That would be 16 something that we would look at. 17 know, assuming once the approval is given, that may well be something we 18 19 look at it. 20 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Jim, before 21 you go any further, Marie Diglio, EMS Council Executive Director, would like 22 23 to say something. Marie? 24 MS. DIGLIO: I just wanted to 25 address the territory. When The

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 Regional Council does consider the 3 application and make a vote, the motion 4 will have to include the updated 5 territory, which would be inclusive of the expanded territory, and at that time 6 7 we can clarify all the territories and 8 that's the way it will go up to the 9 Department of Health. 10 MR. DOWNEY: Jim Downey, that's all 11 my questions. 12 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Jim, thank 13 you. 14 Others present from the Ambulance 15 Committee that have questions? 16 MR. RANERI: Frank, this is Joe 17

MR. RANERI: Frank, this is Joe
Raneri. May I make a suggestion? When
opening up for questions to prevent
people from talking over one another, I
would recommend you have them use the
raise hand function that is part of the
program. So if they are online they can
click on the button to raise the hand
and you can choose which person to
recognize. If you are on the phone, you

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: For those of you who may need to, it's usually under the more button on your Zoom dashboard. I know it's on my mine and you can let me know if you need to raise your hand. I'm raising mine right now. I'm not sure if that can be seen or not, but once I see it, I will certainly acknowledge, and ask you to go forward and typically a raised hand comes straight to the forefront, so you won't be left behind. I see no raised hands. Does anyone have questions but can't raise their hand for whatever reason you are un-handable?

MS. SEINFELD: Yes. I am the retired district manager of Community
Board 11, which covered Northeast Queens and in the area where Glen Oaks
Volunteer Ambulance Corps is looking to expand their (inaudible) area and I'm also a resident in Floral Park, Queens, which is part of the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance area, so I'm familiar with them.

I just wanted to speak on my
experience when I was the district
manager. A few times the other
ambulance corps, the Bayside Ambulance
Corps, had spoken at the Community Board
and they did offer program and they also
were trying very hard to recruit members
and that's going back five to ten years
now that they had come and were
recruiting. I retired three years ago,
but before my retirement, it had become

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REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 known to me that we were unable to get hold of them and then I was told that they had closed the doors and, you know, it was very disappointing. I was very pleased when Glen Oaks volunteers applied and said -- I heard that they were going to go into that area because as a resident of the area, I know of their reputation and our neighbors have I mean, I fortunately used them. haven't had to, but that they have been They are a very visible presence there. in the community. You see their ambulances on calls constantly. offer training, they have done blood drives, which I have participated in. They have just been very available and I am hopeful that they will be very available in the Bayside area because there was certainly a gap in coverage and after all the wonderful things that Bayside might have done at the time, unfortunately, it seems they couldn't get the recruit to continue and it was

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 very disappointing. So there's a real 3 gap there and I support their 4 application for extending their coverage 5 into this area. Thank you. 6 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you, 7 Ms. Seinfeld. 8 Do we have any questions of 9 Ms. Seinfeld either from the Ambulance 10 Committee? 11 MS. SEINFELD: Let me just say, 12 having been the district manager, the lines that you are talking about, there 13 14 are some weird places in the lines that 15 are drawn that are the Community Board 16 11 where you think that maybe they would 17 be the other Community Board, but they are not. So, yeah, that would be 18 19 something you would have to tweak 20 whether you follow the CB 11 line 21 exactly or you adjust it to make it 22 reasonable for the coverage of the area. 23 Thank you. 24 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you 25 again.

Ι don't see hands. 3 4 (No response) 5 All right, I'm going to move on to, if I understand correctly, Greco, Louis 6 7 Greco.. 8 MR. GRECO: Hi, yes, Louis Greco. 9 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: 10 Mr. Greco, is it spelled L-O-U-I-S G-R-E-C-O? 11 MR. GRECO: Yes, sir, that's 12 13 correct. Good evening, I serve as the vice chair of District 4 of the New York 14 15 State Volunteer Ambulance Association 16 and I'm attending tonight's public 17 hearing to speak in favor of Glen Oaks application to expand their operating 18 19 territory into the area formerly covered 20 by Bayside Community. 21 Today, volunteer EMS agencies face many challenges and sometimes obstacles. 22 23 If it's not financial, it has to do with 24 their membership base or EMS provider 25 training and updates. We also must

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 adhere to the community' needs and expectations as well as organizational leadership development and succession planning. Tonight I'm pleased to be able to endorse Glen Oaks VAC's expansion application because it will immediately restore volunteer community EMS services to a community, at no fault of their own, lost that type of coverage.

The additional services delivered by Glen Oaks to this area will assist with lowering area EMS response times and permit EMS resources to be at a patient's side quicker, but this is not all that community EMS does. Their service will also be able to provide additional community services, such as CPR training and EED training, EMT services to community events, standby services of such, that allow them to service the community in needs that are not necessarily met if there's no volunteer ambulance in the area. These

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 additional areas of service is what community EMS is known for. Glen Oaks is a very capable and stable organization with leadership that is competent and experienced. They also are open to new practices which are extremely important as EMS evolves.

This is how they have remained relevant and active community participant for years and by expanding into the Bayside area will be able to provide that level of service to the community. In addition, their leadership has demonstrated their commitment to undertaking the important task at hand and has consistently offered their expertise, problem solving and best practices to those who request it.

In a time when many ambulance services are experiencing problems throughout the state, the leaders of Glen Oaks are the same individuals that are called upon to assist other agencies

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facing difficulties because that's
exactly what they do, they respond to
those who are need. Most community
volunteer ambulance agencies need a new
formula to achieve long term stability.
Expansion such as what is being
requested along with operational
partnerships, mergers and consolidations
have often been characterized as dirty
words in the volunteer sector, but now
we need to be able to focus on what is
the future of volunteer EMS should it
continue to succeed in our region.

I thank all of you for taking the time to hear me out and partaking in this process. I look forward to the approval of Glen Oaks expansion application.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Greco, thank you for your time. I actually have a couple of questions, if I could. Both you and Mr. Ehrhardt may have used almost the same language or maybe the same language of a new formula for a

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volunteer ambulance and, again, I'm

pleased that we have so many people of

interest here tonight who have dedicated

countless hours in the volunteer

ambulance community, but you mentioned a

new formula and you also mentioned,

Mr. Greco, that GOVAC would be -- I'm

going to give a quote "open to new

practices" I'm closing my quote. What

do you mean by a new formula and what do

you mean, you know, if you can speak to

what would these new practices be?

MR. GRECO: So EMS in the volunteer sector like the rest of the EMS industry evolved, but many volunteer agencies have stuck in the mud to the same way that volunteer EMS occurred 10, 20 and even sometimes 30 years ago from everything to pushing along being progressive from a medical care point of view to how they retain and recruit their membership, and if you look at their roster and you look at some of the other organizations that are

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REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 progressively moving forward and their membership rosters and their availability to be of service to the community that they serve, it's present where you see other organizations that may be doing things the same way, like I said, decades previous, but they are losing their membership legs. don't have the availability to provide services to their community. Glen Oaks has time in and time out showed that they are willing to change the way they do things, they are willing to address their membership needs because you are dealing with a volunteer workforce to address the needs that their members have to keep them engaged, and that's at the end of the day, why their trucks are on the road, why their trucks are serving the community and some other agencies, you know, aren't able to do so and that's something that's really important. And I'm not saying that those other agencies don't have the

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 ability in the future to do so as well, 3 and I think that's just another step 4 here is that Glen Oaks has been willing 5 to help other agencies along the way to get their agencies up to snuff to where 6 7 they need to be to provide the valid services that their communities require. 8 9 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you. 10 One further and final question, how long 11 have you been associated with the New York State Volunteer Ambulance & Rescue 12 Association? 13 14 MR. GRECO: I have been the vice 15 chair for this year and I serve as the 16 president and chief of Park Slope 17 Volunteer Ambulance in Brooklyn for the 18 past ten years and have been a member 19 there for approximately 15 years. 20 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you 21 for your service and thank you for your 22 presence here tonight. Questions for 23 Mr. Greco? 24 (No response) 25 This is like my 6th grade classroom.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Berlin, again, Frank Schorn, what I want to make super clear is that when I make my recommendation, it is the entirety of everything. There are a number of enumerated factors that have to be considered and they will, in fact, be considered by me, you have my promise and I think I have a fairly good track record of making sure that -- there will

BERLIN: Thank you and we have 9 full faith and I didn't mean to imply at 10 all, but I do note that since they wanted to be here and weren't able to 11 12 just to particularly point to their 13 letters, but we have full faith. 14 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I want to 15 make sure I'm waving the flag of 16 neutrality of Switzerland right here 17 that, you know, the fact that someone isn't here, you know, we are not keeping 18 19 score. It's not Dodgers versus Rays. 20 Congrats to the Dodgers fans. We are 21 going to move on to the opposition. Christopher Capo I believe is from 22 23 Bayside Volunteer. 24 Mr. Capo, are you here tonight?

MR. CAPO: Yes, I am.

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Capo,

I'm going to yield the floor over to

you, sir.

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MR. CAPO: Thank you, sir. My name is Chris Capo, C-H-R-I-S C-A-P, as in Peter, O, and I am now the current president of the Bayside Community Ambulance Corps.

I want to say that, yes, we have lost our operating license and I feel this is more of a courtesy of me to come on and speak to you. At the present moment we are restructuring our organization because of the previous administration, all of this has I have received documents happened. from DOH on their investigation, on the hearing and so I'm fully aware of what was done and what wasn't done. I'm here today to explain that Glen Oaks is a fine unit. They have roughly 20,000 people in their population. They have three ambulances, they have paramedics as well. Bayside consists of over

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 40,000 people, probably close to 50 and so this basically would be doubling their territory.

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Now, Bayside may not be up and running. I have a building, I have two ambulances and at the present moment I'm still working with the AG trying to get my house in order. To give my territory or once was my territory to Glen Oaks, I feel is more or less a problem. I don't believe that putting one bus in this territory would suffice since we used to run two. If they were dispatched from their location and they have to go through highways and congested areas just to get to the center of Bayside. I'm not saying they couldn't do it, nor am I saying they are understaffed, what I'm trying is they would be pulling their community's insurance for this type of work and dropping it into Bayside. I feel that if something did happen, if COVID did come up again, and we know it is, that this bus would be

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 pulled from our neighborhood.

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I'm trying to get the ambulance corps back up and running. I am working diligently to get all this mess that was left to me in order. I would like the time to get it done and working again. I have support, I have financial support. I do have people that are interested and ready to get involved. have members from ten years and back willing to work with me. All I ask is for the time. I will have to resubmit an application in and while I'm waiting to get this all done, Bay Comm and Little Neck Douglaston are willing to work with me to cover my area to help me with my needs, to assist me in whatever I would need to get my ambulance corps back up and running. Again, I do understand what was done by the previous administration, how they were trying to be reached. These people right now are no longer part of our ambulance corps or are no longer part of anything to do

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 with the administration. All I ask is that I have some time, I have the coverage and I can get this back up and running. I may not have everything that Glen Oaks has right now, but it doesn't mean I can't. If anybody has any questions, I would be glad to take them.

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Capo, first of all, apologies for mispronouncing your name. Secondly, thank you for your presence here tonight. Thank you for the open and transparent way that you appear to be conducting what is probably a difficult situation under any circumstances. is not my job to mediate or conciliate, however, it probably would be a nice idea if there may be mediation conciliation and coordination with your organization and GOVAC, you know, irrespective of the application that's going forward, but that is not my role here tonight and that's not the role of this process, and I don't mean to be

GORMAN: Absolutely, Edward 22 23 Gorman, G-O-R-M-A-N, president chief of 24 operations Queens Village Bellerose 25 Ambulance.

I will give you a little MR. CAPO: bit of a background. My family has lived in this town for 75 years. My grandfather was one of the original founders of Bayside Ambulance Corps. Ι also have a strong presence in the community with a lot of the business people and also different organizations. So to answer your question, I don't think I would have a problem working with the community or getting the community's support. Right now, I don't need their money. I just need to get everything in order first and then I can reopen. Also, you know, applying and

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all other things needed. I also have
Bay Community and Little Neck Douglaston
who have reached out to me more times
than I can tell you. Glen Oaks has
never offered their help to me. Bay
Community and also Little Neck have. So
I believe I have a big support staff
behind me to reopen this ambulance
corps. My grandfather started it and I
hate to see it go down.

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MR. BERLIN: I don't mean to jump This is Michael Berlin, but I in. believe the purpose of the hearing is on our application. This isn't a question of competing applications one or the This is a question of whether or other. not there's a public need and whether or not Glen Oaks has the resources and the other pieces to do there. I appreciate Mr. Capo's situation, but again, there is no other application. It has been two years without any application that's That's part of what led to this there. application being put forward and the

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you. Go ahead.

MR. LYONS: I am the president of the Bay Community Volunteer Ambulance Corps who currently holds the operating certificate for North Bayside. We are here to speak in opposition of the expansion from Glen Oaks as it's currently written. Basically one of our issues is the community support and the fact that Glen Oaks is not Bayside community based. Their only location is on 25702 Union Turnpike in Glen Oaks. It's a 20-minute drive from its headquarters to most parts of Bayside and Bayside is primarily a residential neighborhood that has many geographical boundaries blocking direct access from its Glen Oaks headquarters. includes bodies of waters, park, the Long Island Rail Road all of which (inaudible) access to area from a roadway perspective. The ambulance will

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need to return to its headquarters

frequently (inaudible) changes,

equipment resupply and decom. This will

make it more difficult to carry over

response times stated in the application

for the new area.

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Additionally, by removing an ambulance and crew from Glen Oaks current territory is very likely that the response time quoted will in actuality increase. Due to the great distance from the community, Bayside residents won't benefit from any additional services that Glen Oaks offers as its headquarters as it is not easily accessible via walking, biking, public transportation or car. Since its operation is not local to the Bayside community, any income from the Bayside operation, which should entirely be going back into the Bayside Community, will now be going to subsidized Glen Oaks Community as it is primarily a Glen Oaks based organization.

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After reviewing the application, the support we don't see from the community We don't see a list of letters itself. of support from many individual residents, we don't see Bayside residents making donations for this in support of this expansion, and a lot of the community support that went through the Community Board and from some of the other people all have backgrounds with New York Hospital Queens. In the application they also mention that they might see an increase to the hospital from this expansion. Knowing the Bayside Community, we know a lot of community members here choose a different service than 911 because they primarily want to go out to Northwell Manhasset. So we don't think as a lifelong Baysider that's really truly in the interest of everything for the Bayside Community.

The other thing is that, you know, there's no other really letters of

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 endorsement from anyone who really surrounds the borders of Glen Oaks border today. None of their neighbors support this expansion or submitted a letter for it and the community benefits most from a community based organization that's actually based in the community its servicing. (Inaudible) exists in expansion the need would be best served by restoring Bayside VAC and that's something that we would work and help with and provide our expertise for.

You know, the only -- if not the only reason for our opposition, the restoration of Bayside VAC should they be unable to restore, we are still opposed to this expansion. In past years, you know, we have been asked and agreed to attend multiple carnivals sponsored by various community associations. We have also made presentations to Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts in the area and since they border right next to us, logically, for the

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 community, we are the choice for them. We have opened up our CPR classes, our first aid classes to residents of the Bayside Community as Bayside was, you know, in dire condition and we did try, you know, for the last ten years to work with administrations at Bayside, but they did not want to work with us, no different than, you know, with Glen Oaks or the district New York State had reported.

Due to these ties with the residents, businesses and organization with Bayside we believe that if Bayside VAC is not reinstated that, you know, Bay Community would be ready, willing and able to apply for an expansion or a territory further into Bayside.

We are certain that we would be better suited than Glen Oaks as we are currently situated to service this community and be able to do it with no negative effects to our current area, supplies or budget. You know, Glen Oaks

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 says that they are a small Volunteer Ambulance Corps, we are even smaller. So, you know, it's always been something that we have discussed through the years about doing and really -- you know, we would like to work with Bayside at the first choice. You know, their headquarters is right in the center of Bayside. It's ideally -- it's similar to the way the fire department has firehouses set up in communities and really is truly a nice community based service and that's all I have to say for now.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Lyons, thank you very much. You raised some points that I'm going to ask the applicant to address at some point, but later on about the increase in response time to Bayside. If the applicant would like to ask you questions of it, or if we could possibly address the issue of response time, the claim that you are making of a 20-minute drive from --

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 again, as your regular car goes, what 3 would be the response time from Union 4 Turnpike out to Bayside and clarify, 5 again, is there going to be satellite 6 office set up in Bayside, and is 7 response time going to be unrealistic, 8 and more importantly from the way I'm 9 thinking right now, could peoples lives 10 be put at risk by saying, okay, I'm 11 going to get the volunteer ambulance 12 coming over, but then it's such an 13 extended response time that's even 14 longer than the nine minutes plus that a 15 FDNY bus would take or a responding New 16 York City FDNY sponsored bus would take? 17 MR. BERLIN: Henry, do you want to address that? 18 19 MR. EHRHARDT: I can address that. 20 MR. BERLIN: I would like to address 21 a couple of other points, if you don't mind, that were raised after he's done. 22 23 That was Michael Berlin, sorry. 24 MR. EHRHARDT: I can get from this 25 end of Queens to the other end of Queens REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020
in 20 minutes. It's not going to take
20 minutes to get to Bayside and as I
outlined in my testimony, there are a
number of modalities that we can
conceivably use to address the response
time issue. We have members in Bayside,
we can equip them with first responders,
we can find real estate and locate an
ambulance in Bayside.

Should the Attorney General determine who actually should be the trustees of the Bayside Volunteer Ambulance Corps, we would certainly be open to working with them and talking about what kind of collaborative effort we could do to obtain, you know, more members and service in Bayside.

I also just want to address that, you know, in the interest of people going to North Shore Manhasset Hospital, we deliver there regularly now so any illusion that we are not able to take people to North Shore Manhasset is pure nonsense to be quite frank.

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I also want to address the fact that Mr. Capo said that Little Neck Douglaston and Bay Community are willing and able to serve his area right now. Absolutely not. None of us can serve his area right now because there is no certificate of operation that he holds. That's why there's That's the problem. a need, that's why we are doing this, but you cannot go in there, we cannot go in there and he cannot authorize anybody to go into that area. That's a really misunderstanding and lack of knowledge about what's going on here and what the process is, but also what the legal requirements are to run an ambulance service and that's a very serious matter. I have to raise that because that's a serious issue and it's simply wrong.

Also, we did not hear from Mr. Capo until our application was out there. He reached out to who we knew to be the Bayside Volunteer Ambulance Corps many

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MR. BERLIN: Also, one more point, and I want to go back to this, there is only one application that is in there. I mean, there have been two years of this period here. We are the ones who are stepping forward. We have put in this application, we have the resources. We do think this will be a great benefit to the community and there is community I mean, if you look at our support. submission, you will see the letters from the elected officials who represent Bayside and you will see others who are in the community who do support what's going on there. Again, I know you will be reviewing the application, but it is in there and the reason we are doing this and the reason that we think it's so important is that there is no service there right now. We are the ones who are ready to do this. There are no other applications despite over two years of not having the service here and

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 the reason that we have chosen to do 3 this is that we believe it will be a 4 benefit to the community and we feel 5 very strongly about that. HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: And that 6 7 was Mr. Berlin. 8 MR. BERLIN: Sorry, Mr. Berlin 9 again. 10 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: And this is 11 Schorn again. Just so we are super 12 clear, again, Mr. Ehrhardt, we are not 13 passing on whether another organization 14 would or would not be as good or better, 15 it's is there a need for the services 16 that GOVAC would provide in the Bayside 17 So we are not bouncing like who area. is better, who would be better. We have 18 19 exactly one application over here and 20 that's all we have. Now, again --21 MR. EHRHARDT: We believe --HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Please 22 23 allow me to finish. 24 MR. EHRHARDT: Oh, sorry. I thought 25 you did.

Our new administration will not drop the ball. We have members that will held the leadership accountable.

We have truly started an E-board and everything that we need to have while

There is no application sadly or not sadly, I spent many, many fun times with Bobby Debreky when I was at Flushing Valleys in the early '90s, but unfortunately we don't have an open application from Bayside and we don't have an open application from Bay Community as to whether or not they can or can't take over. We only have in front of us an application from Glen Oaks and so I think that it's important that we keep this hearing focused on the positive and negatives of the application and not any other crews as we have done, unfortunately, in past application any other agencies since there are no other open applications right now so I'm just respectfully requesting I think for everybody here that we stay focused on Glen Oaks, on the need presented in their application and that we are able to judge and review

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 the facts or the opinions or the 3 materials that they presented as such. 4 I'm done. 5 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Scott, 6 point well taken. Thank you. 7 Joe? 8 MR. HEFFERNAN: Yes, I would like to 9 answer Scott's thing, but we are talking 10 about a community here, we are not 11 talking about --MR. RANERI: Hold on, Mr. Heffernan. 12 13 MR. HEFFERNAN: It is about a 14 community that needs to be served. 15 MR. RANERI: Frank, I muted 16 Mr. Heffernan because he was not 17 recognized by you. HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: When I said 18 19 Joe, I was putting it back to Joe 20 Raneri. Mr. Heffernan, I apologize. 21 I could, and I know the time is late and we scheduled this until 8:00, I think 22 23 it's important that we continue this and 24 I'm going to, but I want to stay focused 25 as Scott just indicated and keep the

Is there anything that we haven't already said, Mr. Heffernan, that you still need to share with us? If so, please let me know and let me give you that opportunity.

MR. HEFFERNAN: The only thing I was saying, the thing I was talking about was the Bayside Community, not just the ambulance corps, the community how it was going to be served and that should be part of this meeting because that would be part of how they turn around and be able to service that area.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: And those points have been raised and I'm not minimizing them the least bit. I can tell you that it's going to be considered and the points that you spoke of. So you definitely have been heard and those points will definitely be addressed in my report and, again, I thank you for raising those points.

RANERI: I saw Travis Kessel 3 4 from the committee had raised his hand 5 and then lowered it and you have one community member, Mr. Paul Myer, which 6 7 his hand is raised. HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: In this 8 9 committee? 10 MR. RANERI: No. Paul Myer is a community member. Travis Kessel has his 11 12 hand raised, he is a committee member. 13 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Kessel, 14 I'm going to go to you. Community 15 members, I'm going to ask to wait until 16 we have -- I think there's one further 17 possibly scheduled speaker after Mr. Heffernan, but Mr. Kessel you have a 18 19 question. If you do, please, we would 20 love to hear from you tonight. 21 MR. KWOK: Hi, Mr. Schorn, Travis Kessel, T-R-A-V-I-S K-E-S-S-E-L. 22 Ι 23 think that may have been an issue with 24 the raising from earlier, but I just 25 wanted -- as a Bayside resident and a

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 member of Glen Oaks, the reason I joined 3 Glen Oaks was the Bayside and Bayside 4 adjacent ambulance calls didn't answer 5 calls when applications were put in. That's how I wound up with Glen Oaks and 6 7 they are the only ones consistently who 8 serviced any part of the Northeast 9 Queens area over the last ten to fifteen 10 years. 11 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you, 12 sir. I believe we have another person, 13 14 Yoona Kim who I believe is listed as 15 president of Little Neck Douglaston 16 Volunteer Ambulance. 17 MS. DIGLIO: I don't believe she's 18 here. 19 MR. MAI: Good evening. Yoona Kim 20 was unable to make it tonight. Paul 21 Mai, I'm speaking on behalf of Little 22 Neck Douglaston. 23 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Mai, 24 would you like to speak in her place? 25 MR. MAI: Yes, please.

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Okay. If you could just spell your name for transcription purposes and you are

5 welcomed here tonight, sir.

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MR. MAI: Paul Mai, P-A-U-L, last name Mai, M-A-I. Hi, good evening everyone. Like I said earlier, I'm speaking on behalf of Yoona Kim and the president of Little Neck Douglaston Ambulance Corps. We are speaking in opposition for this expansion of Glen Oaks into Bayside. I'm going to keep this short and straight to the point. One, the extended response times, Glen Oaks headquarters right now are currently located on Union Turnpike. Bayside is not only an adjacent neighboring town, but would cut through either Little Neck, Douglaston or Jamaica Estates to reach the destination of Bayside, which all already have active operating certificates. With the extended response times and potentially dangerous emergency response only to be

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 canceled by either an FDNY municipality or volunteer units already stationed and 3 4 posted in the Bayside area. I see the 5 benefits do not outweigh the risk. Secondly, like Mr. Lyons stated 6 7 earlier, we don't see any endorsements 8 from residents or businesses of Bayside 9 supporting the need for this expansion 10 from Glen Oaks. 11 I do have a question for GOVAC. 12 this servicing expansion going to be ALS 13 or BLS service only? 14 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: And I'm 15 happy to have that question answered, 16 Mr. Mai. 17 Mr. Ehrhardt, were you present for 18 that question? 19 MR. EHRHARDT: Yes. We are an 20 authorized ALS service provider. Began 21 our ALS service in March and we would 22 obviously provide an equivalent level of 23 service throughout our service 24 territory. 25 MR. BERLIN: I would like to just

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 answer one thing. I mean, we don't 3 respond from our headquarters and we do 4 cover Bayside. I'm not sure I 5 understand some of the comments or the other things that have been put forward. 6 7 It doesn't seem to be matching either 8 the current situation or what is being 9 proposed here. 10 MR. MAI: I'm just reiterating from 11 your application. You stated you are and ALS ambulance service. Would that 12 13 be ALS servicing the community of 14 Bayside? 15 MR. EHRHARDT: We would provide 16 equivalent service throughout our 17 service area. HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: 18 This is 19 Mr. Schorn. Mr. Ehrhardt, how many ALS 20 buses do you have? 21 Right now we have MR. EHRHARDT: 22 approximately ten paramedics. We are 23 obviously open to receiving more. 24 have one of our ambulances fully fitted

out as ALS and we have available two ALS

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REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 personnel in the headquarters readily 3 available, equipment that they can 4 easily access and put on any of our 5 other ambulances. 6 MR. MAI: From what I'm hearing, you 7 have one ALS ambulance that would only be covering either Glen Oaks area or the 8 9 opposed expansion of Bayside, correct? 10 MR. EHRHARDT: No. We have one ambulance that's fully fitted out. 11 have accessible resources that can be 12 13 quickly deployed on any of other two 14 ambulances. So we have the capability 15 of equipping other ambulances with ALS 16 equipment in a moments notice. 17 MR. MEKETANSKY: Okay. Thank you. 18

That answered my question.

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Just to wrap it up, lastly, just to speak, Little Neck Douglaston does not see the need for this expansion. The benefits of this expansion do not outweigh the risks due to the reasons I stated earlier. Thank you.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Mai,

MS. DIGLIO: I do not see any hands
raised at the moment other than Marie

I was just going to affirm what Mr. Orlanski had stated that there is one application being discussed right now and we need to focus on that one application and deciding whether they are competent and fit and if there is a need for this expansion.

know that's the end of the scheduled
speakers, but this is a public hearing
and I would like to open the floor up to
other people who have interest in
support of or in opposition to the
application and if you can just raise

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 your hand to request to speak. Please wait until you get recognized, identify yourself and if you are part of any community organization or you are just speaking as a concerned member of the community, identify yourself as well.

Joe Raneri, I'm relying on you.

MR. RANERI: Understood. So to reiterate, if you are on the Zoom application, you can use the raise hand function by looking underneath the more option. If you are dialing in on phone, to raise your hand is star 9, to unmute yourself is star 6. If you have any difficulties doing either of those, you may certainly put a message in the chat and I will recognize you through that as well. The only hand or indication to speak I have received is from Mr. Edward Gorman again.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Mr. Gorman the floor is yours, sir.

MR. GORMAN: Good evening. So it goes back to the question I was asking

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 before. I have a question for Mr. Ehrhardt. Can you break down your boundaries for me again? I was a little confused on the boundaries of GOVAC, the current boundaries.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: And we will note it's part of the application, but Mr. Ehrhardt, you can give -- we are not going block by block, give us broad strokes and if this is a particular concern you have, Mr. Gorman, that you are looking to focus in on, please let us know so we can address that.

MR. EHRHARDT: Sure, sure.

Essentially we cover Glen Oaks and

Floral Park in the eastern portion of

Queens along the Queens, Nassau border.

We then cover the area north of Union

Turnpike going west to Oakland Gardens

and then going north to the Long Island

Expressway, which is where we meet the

current Bayside Community Volunteer -
passed Bayside Community Volunteer

Ambulance Corps border.

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 MR. GORMAN: What exactly does your 3 certificate say? Does it say what you 4 are stating right now? 5 MR. EHRHARDT: Well, the certificate lists the broader communities. 6 There's 7 also a map that we have had on file since inception with the New York State 8 9 Department of Health, which basically 10 mirrors what I just said. MR. BERLIN: Can I ask what this has 11 12 to do with the application? 13 MR. GORMAN: It doesn't. What it 14 has to do with the application is if 15 they are fit to cover the Bayside 16 territory. The reason I ask these 17 questions is because, again, I'm the president chief of operations of 18 19 Bellerose Ambulance Queens Village and 20 there's been numerous amount of times 21 that they have responded to calls exactly to building 40 Creedmoor a 22 23 numerous amount of times. I'm trying to 24 find out exactly what their certificate

They sent out a letter stating

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says.

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 1 2 areas that they cover when it's a fund 3 drive letter, but it does not have 4 anything to say with their certificate 5 and I would like to get clarification --MR. BERLIN: I think Marie wants to 6 7 jump in. Hi, Marie Diglio. 8 MS. DIGLIO: 9 copy of the certificate is in the 10 application. Would you like us to put 11 it up on the screen? 12 MR. GORMAN: Can you do that for me, 13 please? 14 MS. DIGLIO: Joe, can you put it up? 15 I sent you the link. 16 MR. ORLANSKI: As the resident 17 cartographer and director of the mapping tag, what does this have to do with 18 19 anything? If GOVAC is operating outside 20 of their certificate of need currently 21 then a complaint needs to be lodged with the Department of Health, Bureau of EMS. 22 23 MS. DIGLIO: You are absolutely 24 correct and there's nothing in Article 25 30 that requires expansion to be to a

MR. GORMAN: The reason --

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MS. DIGLIO: Direct your complaint to the --

MR. GORMAN: If they are competent and fit to cover another area, they are stating -- the breakdown at the end of the day that they are stating they cover an area that they don't, in fact, cover so there's questions on that, and my second question is they are saying they could possibly outfit another vehicle to cover Bayside, but there's no proof that they can do that. So they are going to drive, let's just say, from building 40 of Creedmoor to go all the way to Bayside, that's going to take a little bit of time and traffic to only delay patient care if we are talking about a community that needs help, how are they going to be going to an area that they do not cover to a new area that they do

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 cover and yet they are going to drive a life and sirens across town when there can be an FDNY assigned ambulance only nine minutes away. It doesn't make sense to me and that's why I'm asking these questions.

MR. BERLIN: Mr. Schorn, does he have to answer that? I mean, that didn't seem like that was a question that was relevant at all to he application that's here.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I don't think anyone has to answer any question. I will, again, refocus ourselves. Let's assuming there were some -- that there were violations that are being alleged. Those are just statements being made at this point between us. If it's not in the application, there's nothing that I can really do in giving recognition to any of those complaints that are just now being brought up at this point in time.

MR. GORMAN: It's not so much of a

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 complaint. I'm trying to --

MR. BERLIN: If there was a filed complaint and something which had been filed, that would be one thing, but we are not even talking about that. I would just say our approved map area is what was --

MR. RANERI: Frank, I muted everyone so that you can determine who wants to speak next.

MS. DIGLIO: Frank, unmute yourself if you are speaking.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I have now unmuted myself. Thank you, Joe. If there were transgressions, if there were violations, that is an issue beyond what we have here tonight. Had there been complaints, they should have been included in opposition. My understanding from my review that complaints or charges being raised by Mr. Gorman, even if -- and I'm not saying that they are, even if they were valid, they don't appear from my review,

unless I missed something, to have been included in the application and from that standpoint, the process that I'm going to be reviewing is limited to the documentation that's presented. If I were to introduce and accept new information, new evidence, I will be faulted for having done so because the application is the application, and the application is complete, including opposition materials and that has not, as I understand, been included so far.

So even if valid, Mr. Gorman, and I take your point, but it's not something that I would be able to act on. That's not saying that you are not right, that's not saying you don't have other venues to act on it, but it's beyond what we can do here this evening. If there are other points beyond that, I would like to hear it, but I do want to kind of move things along just a little bit and give time for conclusions.

Again, I have not made up my mind,

Dut there are things that I can't listen to and new evidence happens to be some of it and it looks like, Mr. Gorman, you would be presenting something that would be new evidence. I won't even mention the word hearsay -- whoops, I just mentioned hearsay. So it's not going to count for a whole lot of beans right now, but it's just not the right time and place. I don't mean to be rude, but it's just not the right time and place.

Joe, any other people from the community that wish to speak?

MR. RANERI: There are no hands raised at this moment from community members or committee members.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I'm going to ask if anyone has something further, otherwise I'm going to open up to Mr. Berlin. I think you have asked to give a conclusion to the hearing statement and if not hearing anyone else, I'm going to turn things over to you, Mr. Berlin.

MR. BERLIN: Thank you very much and, by the way, I apologize if I jumped in there before I was recognized.

As I have listened to all the testimony, there does seem to be one point of agreement that there is a public need for a Volunteer Ambulance Corps in this community. I haven't heard anybody oppose that or say there isn't a need for it here, and for the last two plus years no certified Volunteer Ambulance Corps has been there to serve the community. This has left 40,000 residents without the optimal service they are entitled to.

Also, I haven't heard anyone question whether the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Corps is qualified, whether it has the experience of almost 50 years, whether they have the resources with its 70 plus EMTs, ten paramedics, 30 plus dispatchers, two dozen youth squad members to fill this need. More than that, the organization has shown

REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 repeatedly that it is a positive force for any community it's a part of through its active involvement in many, many ways and I urge you to look at the application where those are detailed.

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Look, the other thing is that these services are going to be provided with no additional costs to the community. It is a win win in every way for the community that has had to suffer for two years of not having this type of ambulance service to help them. is just simply no reason as I look at the application or otherwise why under the standards that are to be applied here and we have heard a lot of sort of extraneous things that haven't looked at the standards here tonight, but there's no reason that I feel that the approval should not be granted. There's no reason why the community should not have these services.

There are a number of people who have talked about potential ideas that

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REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 they would step in or potential that they would fill a gap or that they would like to, but the fact of the matter is that for two years no one else has applied and we are here now trying to rectify this situation. Not in some hypothetical basis, not in the idea that this may happen or something happens, we may choose to do this. The fact is that the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Corps wants to do this, is committed to do this and has worked very hard to do this and they want to be part of that community as they go forward. I think that if you look at their application, they have talked about their plans to post in the community and to get a facility there. It is certainly valid to look at response times and other things, but I think if you look at our application and you look at the actual map and the actual distance, you will see that this will dramatically cut response times and will be a boon to the REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 community. That's really all I have to say. I hope you will consider it carefully, as I know you will, and we certainly appreciate you taking so much time on this very, very important issue.

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HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Well, I'm going to give thanks back to everyone in the Zoom room for, again your time, your effort, your passion and, again, coming from a volunteer ambulance background myself, you know, we are preaching to the converted and if we kind of see things differently, we don't see it all that differently, we are looking for the best that we can for the people in whatever communities that we are talking about, so I'm gratified that we have that amount of community support and, again, thanks to all of you who have been doing this as a profession or just as a passion without ever having gotten a nickel from doing EMS work. personal thanks.

I'm going to be doing a -- I will do

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my darnedest. All I can try is my best in getting a fair, unbias recommendation to the Ambulance Committee and then to The Regional EMS Council.

I do see Dr. Langsam there and I just want to acknowledge him and thank him for his many years and thank him for his presence here tonight. As for other members of The Regional Council who I did not recognize, please forgive me for that and thank you to everyone here this evening.

I want to bring it back to the final words to Marie before I say the words the hearing is closed and the record is complete, but I'm going to turn it back to Marie Diglio and thanks to Joe Raneri, thank you to the REMSCO staff that helps over here, thank you, Scott, and thank you most importantly to our transcriber for your patience and listening to all of us talking heads and literally talking heads.

MR. RANERI: Just to be advised, I

DIGLIO: As long as they are short. 6 7 Very quick, I promise. MS. BURKE: HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Ms. Burke, 8 9 you are with what organization, please? 10 My name is Alison Burke. MS. BURKE: 11 I'm from the Greater New York Hospital 12 Association. My members participate 13 both in the 911 system with FDNY and 14 also have ambulance agencies that 15 operate for critical care transport and 16 other reasons within their communities 17 and organizations. This has been really an interesting 18 19 conversation. Pre COVID, it probably 20 would have been different, although not 21 much different, and I think we have all 22 learned that there is plenty of 23 opportunity to serve our communities. 24 Everybody looking to have a footprint in 25 the EMS world and to make it to patients REMSCO HEARING - October 28, 2020 calling a service, whether it's 911, a volunteer organization or a call number through some other vehicle, we all have plenty of opportunity.

I would just -- I think we have made a lot of progress over the years and more recently over the pandemic to realize how we coordinate our sparse resources and not highly funded resources, but I would love to see us work more together to serve our communities and I think we all have the same goal. I'm going to put myself on mute because I have animals barking.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you, Ms. Burke, again, for your support and for your wisdom.

Mr. Ehrhardt, I think the penultimate or anti-penultimate word tonight.

MR. EHRHARDT: Just, you know, I tried to explain in my opening testimony a little bit about community boundaries and ZIP codes and how ZIP codes don't

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necessarily follow political lines here
out in Eastern Queens. We are happy to
clarify any of that for The Regional

Council that you need clarified. Our
Oakland Gardens area directly borders on
Bayside. We have always served since
our inception as our map shows and we
haven't changed anything north of Union
Turnpike in that area going from Oakland
Gardens to the Glen Oaks area, but let's
put that aside. We can deal with that
in another way.

I just really wanted to express my thanks to you, the members of the Ambulance Committee and Council who I know spent countless hours, in addition to all the other things they do working on bettering our EMS system in New York City, and I also want to extend my thanks and appreciation to people like Mike Lyons who takes the time out to lead a community Volunteer Ambulance Corps in his area that is a -- as those of us who do now -- daunting and very

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time consuming task today and he and
everybody else who does that, has my
respect and appreciation, and regardless
of whatever disagreement we have today,
I think we all agree that we want the
system to work better. We are prepared
to work with our neighbors to do that
moving forward today and tomorrow
regardless of what happens, so I wanted
to express that appreciation to
everybody and thanks.

HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank you very much.

MS. DIGLIO: Zoey wanted to join the meeting. No, I have nothing to say if you are ready to close up, then I will just give some final remarks.
