2                   her and she had an emergency C-section  
3                   right there in the ER. she didn't feel  
4                   anything. She was out of it.  
5                   These are the types of patients  
6                   that we need to save. I debriefed with  
7                   the ER director after this because I was  
8                   concerned that Hatzalah had taken it  
9                   into their own responsibility to divert  
10                  because I was waiting in the labor room  
11                  for this patient. I had my anesthesia.  
12                  I had everything ready and the ER DOCTOR  
13                  felt that Hatzalah had made the correct  
14                  decision. So there's a lot here. Yes,  
15                  it's true: Women need modesty and some  
16                  women in the audience may know that I  
17                  lecture about modesty. I don't know how  
18                  many women in here know about that,  
19                  especially modesty between husband and  
20                  wife, in laborer and delivery. I'm no  
21                  stranger to that, but we have to  
22                  remember what our goal is. Our goal is  
23                  that every mother should live healthy  
24                  and take care of a healthy baby.  
25                  (Whereupon, applause was given.)

2 MR. DERING: You talked about a  
3 patient and it was the same patient.

4 MS. DVORKES: Yes, I started and  
5 she finished.

6 DR. MANN: I just told her the  
7 story in the car. I have plenty more  
8 stories, plenty.

9 MR. DERING: Okay. Sure. So  
10 let me ask you about stories. Of either  
11 of you, have there ever been any  
12 assertions against you that you provided  
13 an inappropriate or inadequate care?

14 MR. REISNER: Objection.

15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Whoa.

16 MS. DVORKES: I don't even  
17 understand.

18 DR. MANN: Where? In the  
19 hospital?

20 MR. REISNER: Yeah. We're just  
21 kind of throwing bombs here. With  
22 regard to that one case. That's because  
23 the ambulance didn't get there.

24 MS. DVORKES: No, because I  
25 asked her to call the Hatzalah and she

2                   said, "no." If you want to know the  
3                   truth. She said, "no." She was  
4                   bleeding. She said no. There's no  
5                   politics when it comes to saving a life.

6                   MR. DERING: Please, but do you  
7                   know was another ambulance involved?

8                   MS. DVORKES: Yes, the big one.

9                   MR. DERING: Okay. So they did  
10                  call the ambulance?

11                  MS. DVORKES: It was a 15-minute  
12                  drive and we were two blocks away from  
13                  Flatbush.

14                  MR. DERING: So another  
15                  ambulance was called?

16                  MS. DVORKES: Yes, and I asked  
17                  her to call Hatzalah and she said, "no."

18                  MR. DERING: And at the time --

19                  MS. DVORKES: And I said, "you  
20                  don't want to hear me. She said, "I'm  
21                  not supposed to," but that's politics.

22                  MR. DERING: And at the time,  
23                  Ezras Nashim didn't have an ambulance  
24                  that they would transport, right?

25                  MS. DVORKES: No, but they

2                 wouldn't call Hatzalah even to save a  
3                 life.  
4                 MR. DERING: So you had  
5                 indicated one the great things about  
6                 Hatzalah is that they have muscles. Do  
7                 you think that they should have allowed  
8                 women to be EMTs?  
9                 MS. DVORKES: Within certain  
10               parameters, I have no problem. I have  
11               no problem listening to that, within the  
12               parameter of the Jewish law and modesty.  
13               I also know they have two men sleeping  
14               in the ambulance on 16th Avenue for  
15               night calls. I think they're only one  
16               ambulance, but they only need one  
17               because there's no traffic, but you  
18               can't have a woman sleeping there, so  
19               how is she going to get into the  
20               ambulance?  
21               MR. DERING: Thank you.  
22               MS. DVORKES: I mean, I  
23               understand the issues involved, but I  
24               have no problem with it.  
25               MR. DERING: Thank you.

2 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Any  
3 questions?

4 MR. REISNER: No, thank you.

5 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank  
6 you, Ladies. Thank you very, very much  
7 for your time. Do we have further  
8 witnesses?

9 MR. REISNER: I will defer to  
10 your list, Hearing Officer.

11 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN:  
12 According to my list the next person is  
13 Scott Orlanski.

14 (Whereupon, Mr. Orlanski  
15 approached the microphone.)

16 MR. ORLANSKI: Good evening,  
17 everybody. Well, my notes said, "good  
18 evening," but now we are good night. My  
19 name is Scott Orlanski and I represent  
20 the United New York Ambulance Network,  
21 effectually known as UNYAN. UNYAN  
22 throughout the state represents 30  
23 companies and 1,000 ambulances. In the  
24 downstate regions, we represent 12  
25 companies and over 650 ambulances. 650

2                   ambulances that can be brought to  
3                   respond in Borough Park at any time.  
4                   I'm here this evening to speak  
5                   in opposition of the application made by  
6                   Ezras Nashim. Let me be clear: Having  
7                   read through the entire application and  
8                   being as familiar with EMS as I am,  
9                   there is absolutely no need demonstrated  
10                  for a new certificate to be issued. In  
11                  fact, it is our position that granting  
12                  the Certificate of Need would be  
13                  harmful. The idea is EMS's provide  
14                  quality patient care in a timely manner.  
15                  It would be clinically wrong to grant  
16                  the Certificate of Need to provide a  
17                  lower level of care, BLS, than an ALS  
18                  already available in the area by UNYAN  
19                  members as well as existing resources in  
20                  the community.  
21                  The applicant also claims to  
22                  provide slower response times than  
23                  provided by our members and existing  
24                  resources in the community and those  
25                  times are not the standard of care that

2                   the public is looking for. The essence  
3                   of the application is want. And to  
4                   quote the application on page 12 or 13,  
5                   depending on which one you're reading,  
6                   it is a "wish." Policy Statement 06-06  
7                   is very clear about what a public need  
8                   is: A lack of care not currently  
9                   correctible through a reallocation of  
10                  resources. Our 650 ambulances alone in  
11                  conjunction with the fire department,  
12                  voluntary hospitals and the volunteer  
13                  agencies clearly demonstrates that there  
14                  is no lack of care.

15                  If the members of the public or  
16                  the Council do not like or disagree with  
17                  Policy Statement 06-06, then I suggest  
18                  you legislate change. However, until  
19                  such time as 06-06 is amended, revised,  
20                  or repealed, that is the guiding  
21                  document that we are obligated to  
22                  follow. Muddying the waters as the  
23                  applicant has done regarding religion  
24                  and statements of want is problematic.

25                  Advertisements are ongoing to

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   operate in many areas of New York State,  
3                   including Flatbush, Rockland, and the  
4                   Five Towns in Nassau County show that  
5                   the application is filled with  
6                   statements of want and not need. The  
7                   only matter that can be considered by  
8                   the Council are the ones that are  
9                   directed by Policy Statement 06-06.  
10                  Those are: Geography, population, level  
11                  of care, those existing and available,  
12                  quality, reliability and response  
13                  patterns of existing services, types of  
14                  service, emergency or non-emergency,  
15                  special needs, such as air, industrial  
16                  or facility, service effectiveness, cost  
17                  and operation and other local factors,  
18                  not feelings. We are not here to  
19                  discuss feelings.

20                  In their application, the  
21                  applicant does not allege any  
22                  deficiencies, much less prove any  
23                  deficiencies in the current EMS system.  
24                  The application is a 180-page  
25                  beautifully fundraising document that

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   speaks to issues of wants, desires,  
3                   wishes and preferences. It is not the  
4                   purview of the Council to deal with the  
5                   aforementioned wants, preferences,  
6                   desires, or wishes, nor is it ours to  
7                   deal with religious dogma. That is best  
8                   left to the religious leaders and not  
9                   for this Council. We are here to  
10                  discuss and ultimately to vote a need  
11                  and clearly no need exists. Thank you  
12                  for your time.

13                   (Whereupon, applause was given.)

14                   HEARING OFFICER SCHORN:

15                   Counsel, Committee, any questions?

16                   Thank you, Mr. Orlanski.

17                   Who do we have? Rabbi Bernard  
18                   Weinberger? Mayer Freier? Libby  
19                   Mendlovics? And maybe last, but not  
20                   least, Shavy Grossberg? Ms. Grossberg?

21                   MS. GROSSBERG: Yes.

22                   HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Please  
23                   come on down.

24                   (Whereupon, Ms. Grossberg  
25                   approached the microphone.)

2 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I have  
3 news for you. You're not last.

4 MS. GROSSBERG: Thank you.

5 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN:

6 Ms. Grossberg, thank you for your  
7 patience and thank you for being with  
8 us.

9 MS. GROSSBERG: Sure, thank you  
10 very much. Thank you, Hearing Officer  
11 and the Ambulance Committee. Before I  
12 begin, I just want to mention, it's very  
13 interesting what Mr. Freier said, about  
14 a New Square, this big rabbi that had  
15 asked the women to start their own  
16 division. I actually was in New square  
17 when I had pre-eclampsia last year when  
18 I had my baby. And I was there and I  
19 called Hatzalah and the way it works is,  
20 they don't have their own division.  
21 It's that the Hatzalah member comes.  
22 You get into the Hatzalah ambulance.  
23 They actually make a stop at one of the  
24 women's homes and then she comes into  
25 the back of the Hatzalah van and I was

2 more than happy when she sat there  
3 holding my hands the whole time. So I  
4 just wanted to clarify that.

5                   So I've been teaching for over  
6 20 years. The first thing I do when I  
7 go into a classroom is, I give out my  
8 phone number and I tell all my students  
9 that if you ever feel alone and you ever  
10 feel you have no one you can turn to,  
11 you can always call me. Over the years,  
12 I had many different students come and  
13 call me with different problems,  
14 different issues that they don't want to  
15 discuss with someone else. That ended  
16 up morphing into me mentoring teens.  
17 I've had several people live in my  
18 homes, in my house, for extended periods  
19 of time, whether it was a student of  
20 mine or word got out.

21                  You know, I recently had a woman  
22 who was thrown out of the home and she  
23 stayed in my home for several months, so  
24 what ended up happening was, with all of  
25 this going on, I sort of like became the

2                   address for people to go to, to call  
3                   when they felt there was an issue in the  
4                   community. So, over the past few  
5                   years -- I'm very lucky. I've been very  
6                   instrumental in having many, many  
7                   meetings with very important people in  
8                   the Borough Park community and  
9                   implementing new initiatives, and  
10                  amongst them were in our education  
11                  system and many meetings with different  
12                  principals and we discussed new ideas  
13                  and new initiatives, which we then  
14                  implemented.

15                  I was also a very big advocate  
16                  for early detection and early awareness  
17                  and in the summer months, I just felt  
18                  that mothers just had a little more time  
19                  on their hands and many of us go upstate  
20                  to the Catskills, so we did have groups  
21                  of women actually travel to different  
22                  (indiscernible) in the Catskills and  
23                  speaking about this in a more relaxed  
24                  fashion.

25                  I am also involved in the

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   special needs community. What ended up  
3                   happening was, there were a lot of women  
4                   who approached me when a child was born  
5                   and they didn't know where to turn. It  
6                   just morphed into that. I actually  
7                   started a hotline that is worldwide.  
8                   Anybody from all over the world that has  
9                   a special need child can call this  
10                  hotline and they can discuss it -- we  
11                  can discuss it amongst ourselves and we  
12                  have educators coming on. It's  
13                  something very special and something  
14                  very, very helpful in the special needs  
15                  community.

16                  One of most the important things  
17                  that I started was something called the  
18                  Food Pantry. I don't think anybody here  
19                  has ever heard of it; that is because we  
20                  keep it extremely, extremely discreet,  
21                  but I did have women who would ring my  
22                  bell and tell me that they couldn't feed  
23                  their familiars and I couldn't believe  
24                  it. This is going back like 10 years  
25                  ago. And I said, how could that be?

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   That there's food stamps and someone --  
3                   HEARING OFFICER SCHORN:  
4                   Ms. Grossberg, I apologize. Could I ask  
5                   you to try to stay relevant to -- I'm  
6                   sure you do many good works and I don't  
7                   mean to diminish it, but could you focus  
8                   on what we're here for tonight and speak  
9                   on the application?  
10                  MS. GROSSBERG: Yes, my  
11                  apologies.  
12                  HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Thank  
13                  you.  
14                  MS. GROSSBERG: What I was  
15                  trying to say was (indiscernible) when  
16                  there is a void or when there is a need  
17                  in the community, most likely, I will  
18                  have heard of it. I have people call me  
19                  constantly: "We need to do something."  
20                  Never, not even once, has anyone ever  
21                  approached me that they felt there was a  
22                  need for a women's emergency service, so  
23                  that's one point that I wanted to make.  
24                  The second point that I wanted  
25                  to make is that, one of the issues that

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   came to my door was a woman from Canada  
3                   who reached out to me, her name was  
4                   Ms. Sveltzer (phonetic). She had  
5                   written a book on modesty and she had  
6                   the signatures of many big rabbis and  
7                   she wanted me to bring it to Borough  
8                   Park, which I did. And I lectured  
9                   extensively on it, on different things,  
10                  such as, not only modesty in looks, but  
11                  also not speaking loud in public and,  
12                  you know, different -- really, it was on  
13                  many different things.

14                  I spoke at extensively in  
15                  different schools and answered women, so  
16                  when it comes to modesty, again, I will  
17                  have people call me and ask me questions  
18                  and never, again, not even once has  
19                  anyone ever said, I feel like it's a  
20                  breach of modesty when Hatzalah member  
21                  comes to my door. So I just wanted to  
22                  finish on that.

23                  I'm sorry. I know I said I was  
24                  finished, but I wanted to mention one  
25                  more thing, please.

2 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Please,  
3 go ahead.

4 MS. GROSSBERG: I did have to  
5 call a Hatzalah member once. I have  
6 eight children and one of my pregnancies  
7 -- it's like the doctor said, you know?  
8 It's just an uncomfortable position and  
9 he was so caring and so nice that when  
10 my son got engaged and we were shopping  
11 around for a diamond, I actually told my  
12 husband, I believe that the Hatzalah  
13 member who helped us deals in diamonds  
14 and he had such integrity in helping me  
15 I can't imagine a better person to sell  
16 us a diamond. I had no doubt that he's  
17 extremely truthful and in his integrity.

18 MR. REISNER: No questions. It  
19 has come to my attention that we do have  
20 one other witness. I would defer to the  
21 good doctor though. He's been waiting  
22 so patiently. We could bring her after.

23 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Okay.  
24 Who did I miss?

25 MR. REISNER: Blima Halpert.

2 Can we add her?

3 HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Yup,  
4 the name is there. I apologize. That's  
5 my overlooking. Ms. Halpert, are you  
6 here? Doctor, do you mind?

7 Ms. Halpert, come down. Thank you and I  
8 apologize.

9 MS. HALPERT: My name is Blima  
10 Halpert. I'm your typical Borough Park  
11 Jewish woman. By "typical," I mean I  
12 was Borough Park. I went to school in  
13 Borough Park. I got married in Borough  
14 Park and I married a man incidentally  
15 who also lives in Borough Park and I  
16 have 10 children, Thank God. So I  
17 pretty much feel comfortable coming up  
18 here representing the people because I  
19 know the mindset of our women.

20 Now, I had a nice speech  
21 prepared and then I got sidetracked  
22 because I was hearing so much other  
23 information from 5 o'clock until now  
24 that I just started scribbling so many  
25 things and I just was like, do I give my

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2 speech? Do I respond to what I heard?  
3 I think I'm just going to respond to two  
4 things, because people made such good  
5 points. I'm not a good speaker and if I  
6 repeat it or I don't say it as well,  
7 it's not going to kind of ruin it for  
8 the other people.

9                   Now, point number one, when  
10 women call Hatzalah, it's in situations  
11 of emergencies. Ezras Nashim keeps on  
12 talking about calling and feeling. It  
13 just kind of made me wonder why we're  
14 here. We're talking about emergency  
15 situations and the word "trauma" being  
16 thrown around like that, I'm mean, I'm  
17 traumatized, seriously, and for most of  
18 you's who don't follow the Jewish  
19 religion and you don't know us well, I  
20 could really sell you the Brooklyn  
21 Bridge. I could tell you anything and  
22 you'll almost believe me. And the  
23 reason I'm saying that is because not  
24 one person here made this point the  
25 entire time. The entire basis, the

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2       claim of Ezras Nashim is not because  
3       women need better care. It's because  
4       women need people to feel their  
5       feelings. Why? Because modesty is so  
6       important.

7                   Let me tell you how marriages  
8       work in our community, okay? Or let me  
9       go back now to the woman that's  
10      traumatized. A woman that's traumatized  
11      when she gives birth is married, has  
12      relations with her husband, and she's  
13      pretty comfortable with a man in her  
14      life. And yet, in a situation of an  
15      emergency, when she might not make it or  
16      her child might not make it, she is  
17      traumatized by a modest issue.

18                  Let me tell you how kids get  
19      married in my community. You might not  
20      know it. You might get traumatized.  
21      Our children go to separate schools.  
22      Our daughters do not talk to men, right?  
23      That's why women get traumatized when a  
24      man sees them. Our daughters never play  
25      with boys. They reach a young age and

2       they also don't watch -- as someone  
3       said -- they don't have iPhones. They  
4       don't look at TV. They don't know what  
5       a boy or a man looks like. They become  
6       18 and the mother pulls them into a room  
7       and they say, "Honey, I love you.  
8       Marriage is a great thing. We have a  
9       marriage for you." Someone suggested a  
10      boy for you. Do you want to meet him?  
11      And the girl says, "yes." And she talks  
12      to him for an hour and he looks sweet.  
13                  If they're not that Hasidic,  
14      they might meet again. And if they're  
15      not that Hasidic, they might meet even  
16      yet again and then they're engaged and  
17      they never talked to each other the  
18      entire engagement and then they get  
19      married. I have yet to hear of one  
20      bride be traumatized by marriage. She  
21      never saw a boy in her life. She never  
22      spoke to a boy in her life. She never  
23      watched TV. She doesn't even know this  
24      is traumatizing and you know what? They  
25      come to their week after the party and

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2         they're smiling. All the girls are  
3         smiling they're happy and they're on the  
4         clouds. They are so happy. This woman,  
5         when she has a baby, does not get  
6         traumatized when a man sees her, not if  
7         she didn't get traumatized the night of  
8         her wedding.

9                   And I will ask Hatzalah members  
10        here how many times they have calls to  
11        women on the night of their wedding.  
12        Please tell me. And you're going to  
13        convince me that these women, when they  
14        have their children are traumatized,  
15        really? You know what trauma means?  
16        Trauma means hemorrhaging after nine  
17        months of pregnancy and when you say  
18        nine months of pregnancy, it means  
19        nausea, varicose veins, weight gain,  
20        tiredness, everything that goes on, the  
21        whole package and then when she's about  
22        to lose it, she's not traumatized?  
23        That's trauma, and when Hatzalah comes  
24        and delivers that baby or transports  
25        her, they are so grateful. What a

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   distortion of reality. I have heard it  
3                   tonight. It's appalling. I have  
4                   nothing more to say.

5                   (Whereupon, applause was given.)

6                   HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: I want  
7                   to say thank you. I'm going to ask for  
8                   us to calm down, quiet down. Thank you  
9                   again for everyone. Doctor, I think  
10                  you're going to hold us up in the best  
11                  possible way.

12                  MS. HALPERT: Excuse me. Excuse  
13                  me.

14                  HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Yes,  
15                  please.

16                  MS. HALPERT: There are two  
17                  women from the other side that are  
18                  harassing me. They just told me that  
19                  I'm a disgrace.

20                  UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I wasn't  
21                  harassing you. That's my opinion.

22                  MR. REISNER: Order. Order.

23                  HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: Ladies,  
24                  I'm going to ask that -- if you would  
25                  like to have a private discussion at

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2 another point. Right now, we're at a  
3 public hearing. And we want to hear  
4 this. Again, I understand the  
5 sensitivity of the issue. I understand  
6 the polarization that may happen and the  
7 passion that's present, but again, I  
8 think respect is paramount; that's been  
9 here, and I would like it to remain  
10 while we finish up here this evening.

11                  Doctor, if you could just  
12 announce yourself and spell your name  
13 for the record?

14                  DR. KAUFMAN: Yes, my name is  
15 Brad Kaufman, K-A-U-F-M-A-N. I don't  
16 think I'm related to Rabbi Kaufman, but  
17 maybe. I'm from the Fire Department,  
18 which is a proud supporter of Ezras  
19 Nashim and obviously, we work extremely  
20 close with Hatzalah every single day. I  
21 am the first deputy medical director for  
22 the Fire Department and I am also in  
23 that role for the medical director for  
24 the 911 Emergency Medical dispatch  
25 system. I just was going to make one

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2 point, which is directly related to  
3 policy 06-06 and the consideration of  
4 need in reviewing the papers from  
5 counsel for Hatzalah. I did not see the  
6 reporting of the number of times or the  
7 percentage of times when Hatzalah is on  
8 the scene and/or is called and requires  
9 to request resources from 911, because  
10 they have an additional need or require  
11 additional resources. I think that  
12 would be an important point for  
13 consideration when we're taking need  
14 into account. Thank you.

15                   HEARING OFFICER SCHORN:

16 Questions?

17                   MR. REISNER: I would only  
18 submit that it's Ezras Nashim's  
19 application, not Hatzalah's application.

20                   HEARING OFFICER SCHORN: That's  
21 absolutely the case. Any questions from  
22 the Committee? Doctor, thank you very,  
23 very much. Are there any other  
24 witnesses that we have? We're precluded  
25 from inviting people who would like to

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2        come join us. We are not precluded from  
3        coming to an end. I will tell you the  
4        following. Again, I mentioned this a  
5        couple of times:

6                   I am deeply thankful for the  
7        passion and even though the passion may  
8        be uncomfortable, but it is done from  
9        spirit. It is done from heart. It's  
10       done from truth and we may have  
11       different truths. We may see it  
12       differently. I don't know how I see it.  
13       It's complicated. I think I may have  
14       invoked Solomonic decision making and  
15       the only saving grace that I have is,  
16       whatever my recommendation is, these  
17       good people get to decide ultimately, so  
18       I am not making a final determination.

19                  I'm the conduit. I am  
20        privileged to have been here tonight. I  
21        am thankful. It's difficult. Again,  
22       we're bring it back. Need versus want.  
23       Is it legally okay to have all male? Is  
24       it optimal? Is that something that's  
25       cognizable under what we have over here.

1                   REMSCO HEARING - EZRAS NASHIM  
2                   We have a very specific process detailed  
3                   by New York State and in both the law  
4                   and the regulations and the ultimate  
5                   question comes down to what becomes need  
6                   and when the committee will get my  
7                   report, Yay or Nay. I'm sure there will  
8                   be disagreement and there will be people  
9                   who like it and people who don't like  
10                  it, and there will be people in the  
11                  community who like it and don't like it  
12                  and it is what it is.

13                  I will tell you that you will  
14                  get fairness from me. I know the vast  
15                  majority of members of the Ambulance  
16                  Committee and you will get fairness from  
17                  them. They will call it as they see it,  
18                  fairly, without prejudice and I  
19                  certainly wish the entire community,  
20                  again, Chevra Hatzalah has a wonderful  
21                  reputation of timeliness. The level of  
22                  inclusivity of women is not mine to  
23                  judge, but it seems that is a reason why  
24                  we have an application here before us.

25                  How does that play out? I don't


