The Fire Department City of New York (FDNY) has learned of the Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Corps application to the Regional Emergency Medical Services Council of New York City and New York State Department of Health, for expansion of Glen Oaks operating area. Volunteer Ambulance Corps play a critical role in the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) volunteer nonprofit sector.

Our Department was saddened to learn of the Bayside Community Volunteer Ambulance Corps disbandment after fifty years of service. We applaud your organization's willingness to expand volunteer ambulance coverage to the adjacent community comprised of Queens Community Board Eleven, within the confines of the one hundred eleventh police precinct.

We have reviewed the explanation of public need set forth by New York State Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services with regard to EMS Operating Certificate Application Process (CON). Volunteer Ambulance Corps receive and respond to medical incidents privately, not at the direction of the FDNY or NYC 9-1-1 system. The only exception to the current practice is the FDNY coordination of EMS resources provided under the FDNY/REMSCO Mutual Aid Mobilization Plan.

The FDNY provides a tiered response for medical incidents for all NYC communities including the aforementioned area for expansion. Our response consists of Certified First Responder (CFR), Basic Life Support (BLS), and Advanced Life Support (ALS).

The services provided by the defunct Bayside Volunteer Ambulance Corps and existent Glen Oaks Volunteer Ambulance Corps would not affect the FDNY Ambulance Deployment Matrix. Again, we recognize the critical role in the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) volunteer nonprofit sector. Therefore, the FDNY would endorse the recommendation of the committee for the expansion of a Volunteer Ambulance Corp to preserve the continuity of ambulance service in the absence of Bayside Volunteer Ambulance Corps.
