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NYC REMAC			
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The Regional Emergency Medical Advisory Committee (REMAC) of New York City is responsible to develop, approve and implement prehospital treatment and transport protocols for use within the five boroughs of the City of New York. The Regional Emergency Medical Advisory Committee (REMAC) of New York City operates under the auspices of Article Thirty of the New York State Public Health Law.

The Regional Emergency Medical Advisory Committee (REMAC) of New York City has revised the NYC Unified Protocols. All protocols have been approved by the New York State Emergency Medical Advisory Committee for use in the NYC region.

The 2022 protocol implementation date originally set for January 1, 2022 has been extended to February 13, 2022. Paramedic credentialing exams will reflect 2021 protocols until February 13, 2022.

The NYC REMSCO Training and Education Committee has completed a comprehensive on-line training program to assist providers and agencies in updating to the new 2022 NYC Unified Protocols.
